Parking Lots

Parking is available at the Smith College parking garage on West Street, the Indoor Track and Tennis (ITT) facility (on West Street), the stables (off West Street past the ITT, across the bridge and on the left), the Dickinson parking lot (entrance on Green Street), the Ainsworth Gym (off lower College Lane), and Mendenhall Center for the Performing Arts (entrance from Belmont Avenue or West Street/Ahwaga Avenue); there are a few spaces near Sage Hall and at the tennis courts off West Street (across from the stables).

No Parking

There is no parking on the central campus, Prospect Street or at Lamont House circle at any time. Violators will be towed (see below).

Exhibitions

Post-Mao Dreaming: Chinese Contemporary Art

This exhibition celebrates 31 Chinese works on paper, a 2007 gift to SCMA by Joan Lebold Cohen '54 and her husband, Jerome A. Cohen. The works provide a remarkable look into the era when Chinese artists began to throw off the restrictions of China's 30 years of Maoist communism (1949–1979) and reclaim their individuality.

I Heard a Voice: The Art of Lesley Dill

Featuring over 30 works by Lesley Dill (American, 1950–), this exhibition focuses on the artist's recent large-scale theatrical sculptural installations. For the past 20 years, Dill has explored the human form, sensory experience, language and their interactions. Her work can be both ephemeral and spiritual, as she uses bronze, photography, poetry, thread, wire and paper to sculpt her figures and build her tapestries.

Frame Project V: Restoring the Boundaries

Framework V showcases the results of the ongoing work by museum staff and students to conserve frames for the museum's painting collection. In

this apprenticeship program, now in its fifth year, Chief Preparator William Myers and Associate Director David Dempsey train students from Smith and the other five colleges in the techniques of frame conservation. The featured frame in this installation was created in the appropriate pre-Raphaelite style for *Meditation* (1873), a portrait by John Everett Millais and a recent gift to the collection. Additional paintings with newly created or conserved frames will also be on view, including Frederic Edwin Church's *Morning in the Tropics* (1883) and Samuel S. Carr's *Beach Scene* (c. 1879). This project is supported in part by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts and by the Friends of the Museum.

"What Will Come": A film by William Kentridge

This hand-drawn film by the South African artist is an important new addition to the museum's collection. It takes its title from a Ghanaian proverb: "What will come has already come"—a sentiment reflected in the imagery of the film, which speaks to the range of conflicts that have marked modern history. This work also displays Kentridge's keen interest in optics. The film is projected from the ceiling onto a round metal table, which bears a polished circular column in its center. The images are reflected on the surface of the column, which corrects the perspective of the drawing for the viewer. As they circumnavigate the column, the images change form while moving to a haunting musical track.

1. Career Development Office

2. The Alumnae Parade

To honor the tradition of Ivy Days past, all alumnae who wish to march should be dressed all in white and wear a class ribbon. Ada Comstock alumnae may wear a ribbon in their class color and/or the multicolored Ada ribbon. Grécourt Society members may wear additional blue ribbons. Ribbons will be available at the Alumnae House registration tent and along the parade route.

The Alumnae Parade “evolved gradually from the custom of alumnae classes to sally forth upon the campus while the ivy procession was being made up, and extend greetings to the senior class and to each other, and to do honor to the college, its president, members of the faculty and members of the various classes.” The first official parade was held in 1909. Although alumnae now dress uniformly in white, earlier classes had varied, colorful and sometimes quite elaborate costumes. Colored ribbons now differentiate the reunion classes. The class of 1905 was the first to carry “placards,” and by 1915 these signs were a regular feature, “hailed with appreciative applause and laughter all along the march.”

3. The Alumnae Association of Smith College

During reunion in 1881, 47 alumnae from the classes of 1879, 1880 and 1881 founded the Alumnae Association of Smith College. Wanting to instill feelings of Smith pride in future generations of alumnae, they drew up a constitution and crafted a simple purpose: “To further the well-being of the college and its graduates by increasing the interest of members in the college and in each other.”

Providing an array of services to alumnae, the association publishes the award-winning *Smith Alumnae Quarterly*, supports more than a hun-

dred Smith clubs and affinity groups worldwide, and organizes class reunions, symposia, travel programs and other events.

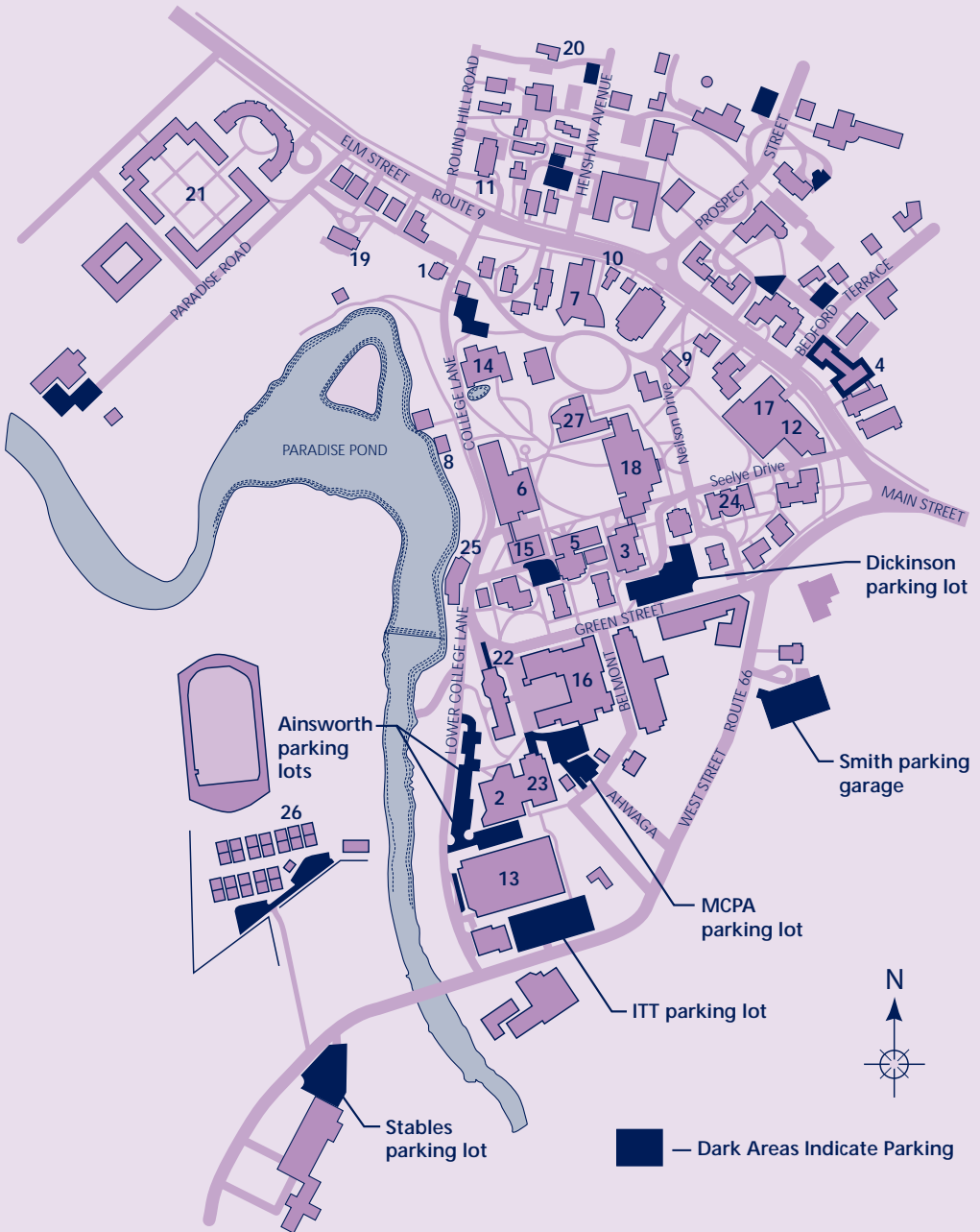
