## Faculty Event - Smith Professor Michael Marcotrigiano

Thank you to all who attended our Faculty Speaker event this year. On February 1st, we hosted Dr. Michael Marcotrigiano, Director of the Botanic Gardens and professor of Biological Science at Smith, to speak on Invasive Species: When Encouraging Diversity Goes Bad. He led a great discussion, bringing awareness to the different threat levels of non-native plant species, including how and why certain species are so destructive to the broader ecosystem. One point that he made clear was that these issues are not the fault of the flora or fauna in the area, but of the people or social situations that introduced those plants to an area outside their native grounds.

We were given some examples of the impacts an invasive plant can have. The "right" combination of non-native plants in a new environment can, for example, change the chemistry of the soil, consequently shoving out native plants that have adapted to those soil conditions. Animals that might have fed or nested in those native plants then have a dwindling habitat and food source, and therefore a scarcer presence. Another threat, such as the highly flammable eucalyptus trees which originate from Australia, have taken up residence all over California, sadly posing a huge fire threat.

Our guests were pleasantly engaged, and asked informed and concerned questions. As always, Shana Nelson Middler and her family were gracious hosts and provided a very comfortable space for us to have this insightful conversation. Many thanks to Shana and to Professor Marcotrigiano for their time and great work!

#### Admissions Update

The College had a record number of applications this year -- 4,544 -- and of that number, 50 are from our Peninsula Club area, which is also a record number. Four of them were Early Decision so we already know that these four students from our area will be members of the Class of 2018! 31 of the 50 applicants requested interviews and we were able to accommodate all of them.

We are SO grateful to ALL of the interviewers, several of whom did multiple interviews and often on very short notice. Great effort and hopefully we will have a great yield. The decision letters will go out March 21.
