We are pleased to welcome to Cleveland Professor Reid Bertone-Johnson, a Lecturer in Landscape Studies and the manager of the Ada and Archibald MacLeish Field station in West Whately, MA. Professor Bertone-Johnson will discuss his work with the Mill River Greenway Initiative, an organization dedicated to designing and creating a greenway along the Mill River, a portion of which flows through the Smith campus.

Professor Bertone-Johnson has integrated the work of his studio classes into projects important to both Smith College and the City of Northampton. He develops studio projects for his students that take advantage of his expertise in sustainable landscape design, broad-scale landscape design, regional planning, and the interpretation and preservation of historic landscapes. His students generate creative solutions to complex problems for actual clients including the Ward 3 Neighborhood Association and the Mill River Greenway Initiative, both in Northampton.

The lecture will be held at the Nature Center at Shaker Lakes, 2600 South Park Boulevard, Shaker Heights and is open to the public. Summer on the Cuyahoga

SOTC welcomed two new staff members in 2018. Executive Director Eric McGarvey hit the ground running in January and has actively engaged with NEO employers and the SOTC Board of Directors. Renee Murry is SOTC's newly hired Assistant Director who joins Eric in bringing organizational expertise and enthusiasm to her new role.

Eric has already visited all seven SOTC campuses and held a well-attended information session at Smith on Feb. 6th. He was joined at the information session by our five SOTC alumnae who are on the Smith campus this year: Natalie Weiss '18, Yvonne Van Leuven '18, Abigael Stephens '18, Sunnie Yi Ning '18 and Natalia Perkins '19 who all shared their love of Cleveland and their appreciation of our Club's outstanding support. Locally, Musette Vincent '78 has joined Marjorie on the SOTC board and both Chloe Lee '17 and Sara Ramasastry '17 have pitched in to help create materials to publicize SOTC on campus.

Already, thirty-one Smith students have submitted applications to SOTC internships and a first hire is pending. Stay tuned! Employer and applicant numbers program-wide are very good. The hiring season, because of bringing on board new staff, is unfolding more slowly than last year but we anticipate reaching our goal of 60 SOTC interns. Several Praxis funded internships are available to Smith students, including two at the Ingalls Library and Archive at the Cleveland Museum of Art. The Ingalls library internship has been available to Smith students since 2015 and we have built a wonderful partnership with the staff at the Ingalls library. The Praxis stipend increased this year to \$3,000 from \$2,400, which is good news for the interns who can have a financially successful summer and even go home with some earnings in their pocket!

As an outgrowth of Smith students' interning at the Cleveland Museum of Art, Cyra Levenson, Director of Education and Academic Affairs at CMA, joined **Marjorie Roth '67** on campus in October 2017 in a meeting with

faculty and staff from the department of art history, museum studies and archival studies as well as staff from the Lazarus Center for Career Development. Marjorie shared with the group the five SOTC internships that can be marketed to students majoring in these areas of study. Subsequent to this meeting and unrelated to summer internships, Cyra has engaged a group that is working to plan an undergraduate semester of study for Smith and Case Western students. Jessica Nicoll '83, Director of the Smith College Museum of Art, Barbara Kellum, Smith Professor of Art History, Betsy Bolman '83, Chair of the Art History Department at CWRU and Marjorie are engaged in planning this new and exciting opportunity. Alumnae News & News from Northampton

William & Mary has named a woman to lead the university for the first time in its 325-year history and there's a Smith connection! The school in Williamsburg, Virginia, said in a statement Tuesday that Smith College provost Katherine Rowe will become its 28th president. Rowe has served as provost and dean of the faculty at Smith since 2014, working as its chief academic officer. Her areas of research and scholarship include Shakespeare as well as Medieval and Renaissance drama and media history. William & Mary said Rowe has been a leader in digital innovation of the liberal arts and transformed Smith's liberal arts curriculum. She also increased diversity in the faculty and broke national fundraising records for women's colleges.

Former United States poet laureate and Pulitzer Prize winner Rita Dove will deliver the commencement address at Smith College's graduation ceremony on May 20. Dove, who won the Pulitzer Prize for poetry in 1987 and served as U.S. poet laureate from 1993-95, is also slated to receive an honorary degree. Along with the commencement speaker, former president of Smith College Carol Christ, Columbia Law School professor Kimberlé Williams Crenshaw, Academy Award winner **Sharmeen Obaid-Chinoy '02** and former president of Greenfield Community College Robert L. Pura will also be awarded honorary degrees.

The Department of Art History and Art at CWRU has chosen **Elizabeth (Betsy) S. Bolman '83** as its new chair and Elsie B. Smith Professor in the Liberal Arts. A leading expert on late antique, Byzantine, and early medieval Egyptian art, Professor Bolman comes to Cleveland from Temple University where she was on the faculty for seventeen years.

The Cleveland Foundation has hired **Dale Anglin '86** as the new program director for youth and social services. Dale spent the past 11 years at the Victoria Foundation in Newark, N.J., where she was responsible for programming in higher education, STEM/STEAM, K-12 education, summer youth employment, and leadership efforts.

Sonya Rhie Mace '93 was featured in a December 2017 Plain Dealer article about the upcoming restoration of the Cleveland Museum of Art's seventh-century Cambodian statue of the Hindu god Krishna. The goal of the project, funded by a \$70,000 Bank of America Art Conservation Project grant, is to dismantle and reconstruct the sculpture's 11 pieces to re-create its correct pose for the first time since the fragments were unearthed in stages starting more than a century ago. In addition to recreating the original pose, the reconstruction will enable viewers to walk around the sculpture and view it from all sides, and will also enable conservators to disassemble and reassemble the Krishna so it can travel to other museums.

Dr. Sheryl Kingsberg '84 has been appointed President of the Board of Trustees of the North American Menopause Society, North America's leading nonprofit organization dedicated to promoting the health and quality of life of all women during midlife and beyond through an understanding of menopause and healthy aging.
