New co-chairs sought

Working with high school students to foster their interest in Smith is a highly rewarding and crucially important task Many of our club members have worked on admissions as their premier job in the club when they're fresh out of school. On November 17, we were treated to a fascinating talk by **Professor** Susan Van Dyne, who joined us from Northampton for a fitting kickoff of our Minnesota Oral History Project. Dr. Van Dvne has been at Smith since 1973 and is Chair of the Program for the Study of Women and Gender. She is recognized nationally for research on ways to integrate Women's Studies in college curricula. "You're already famous," said Van Dyne. "When I mentioned to Nanci Young, head of the College Archives, that I was coming here, she said 'They're crazy for history in Minnesota!' The Smith archivists hope yours will be a model for other clubs to transmit knowledge across generations.'

In her remarks, Van Dyne shared profiles, based on materials in the Sophia Smith Collection, of a number of pioneering Smith students from the late 18th and early 19th centuries. Looking at their lives as undergraduates as well as their accomplishments after college demonstrates how their undergraduate experiences at Smith helped shape their lives and how "talented women who are gathered





ment houses, establishment of kindergartens, public libraries, birth control movements, and suffrage? A premise of the exceptionally fine historical scholarship on this question is that an important catalyst for this change is that women went to college." What were the specific nature and means of the transformation from Victorian ladyhood to public service, asked Van Dyne. Through a series of vignettes and photos, she showed how "social phenomena were as transformative for women attending women's colleges as anything they studied." We heard the tales of Mary Mather, who held late-night coffees in her room: Gertrude Gane, who was a "chemistry girl" and who at elaborate dance parties sans men took on the task of leading; Ada Comstock (pictured above) from Moorhead, Minn., who became Dean of Women at the University of Minnesota, Dean of the College at Smith, and President of Radcliffe; and several others. These exuberant young women, Van Dyne said, "were experimenting with doing their own gender differently." Participating in dramatics and taking on male roles enthusiastically, knocking themselves out in sports, staging the elaborate rituals of

together for 4 years in a community may spark personal transformation."

Of students at Smith then, Van Dyne said parents inculcated expectations of feminine submissiveness, selfless maternity, domestic piety, and rigorous self-discipline. They came from Christian homes and extended networks of female kin devoted to family and church. Before they arrived they were accomplished at fine needlework, sketching, piano playing, and expected to teach, perhaps, but certainly to marry. How did these Victorian daughters come to devote their energies as adults instead to extending the virtues of moral

family life toward those less fortunate-enlisting in causes such as temperance, education of immigrants, reform of child labor, settle-

formal dances, hosting the subversive curfew-defying spreads that bound them to housemates-all meant, in Gane's words, "learning to lead just fine." —Ann Pflaum & Marty Swain
