June 14 was a highlight of our club's year as we met for our Annual Meeting at the Minneapolis Institute of Arts. Justina Roberts '06, our outgoing Vice President, arranged a marvelous brunch, complete with mini-mimosas, appetizers (picture little stacks of the tiniest pancakes ever) and dessert-now that was a brunch! Our speaker was Diane Richard, who is a writer/editor at the MIA. She described the new MIA publication she works on, Verso, a term meaning the flip side of a piece of art. The innovative digital publication truly flips the museum experience over for users, letting them "interact with artwork in ways that take you far beyond what's possible in the galleries, with 360-degree rotations, pinch-and-zoom details, artful games, and more."

Verso won the 2014 International Design communications Award for best museum app, the silver Muse Award from the American Alliance of Museums, and the American Graphic Design Award. It's free for iPads through the iTunes App Store, and you can browse issues through a Web viewer too. Go to: http://bit.ly/18Xk7Eu and scroll down to see the available issues. This is a real treat to see, and it was clear from Diane's entertaining talk that she thinks she has one of the best jobs in the world.

Diane and her colleagues are working on their eighth issue, and the publication has already moved from a guarterly to a bimonthly.

Following Diane's presentation was a business meeting where we heard the "state of the club" address from club president Paul Prahl, the "state our finances" from treasurer Kate Lehmann (see page 4), and the "state of our applicants and current students" from our Area Alumnae Coordinators (see pg 4). Outgoing officers were heartily thanked for their service, and incoming officers were announced and introduced by the Nominating Committee (see President's column, pg 1). It was a wonderful morning!

Treasurer's Wrap-Up

This past year our club transitioned from a calendar year to a fiscal year matching the college's in order to facilitate reporting to Smith. This means there are some extra expenses this year related to the change and there are also some timing issues related to dues, income, and expenses from last year falling into this year.

The Executive Committee approved a balanced budget of \$33,450 for the past fiscal year. We exceeded the income goal by just over \$2,000 and also exceeded the expense budget by \$5,000. Both overages are attributable to timing of income and expenses.

- Our major financial event of the past year was Smith Day: 2013
- ✓ Gross revenues of \$27,000 (vs \$28,300 from previous year)
- ✓ Expenses of \$10,800 (vs \$11,200 from previous year)
- ✓ Net proceeds of \$16,200 (vs \$17,140 from previous year)

✓ We sent \$13,000 to Smith for the scholarship endowment and \$4,800 for two Praxis scholarships. Our club treasury is in good shape. We have about \$20,000 in cash on hand. This reserve is im-

portant, as we need to bankroll many of our Smith Day 2014 expenses in advance. Of concern! We currently have only about 40 dues-paying members out of the hundreds of alums

The Minnesota Smith Club's Book Award, which recognizes outstanding high school women with excellent academic and personal achievements, were awarded this spring to students at Edina and Breck high schools. The award serves to publicize Smith's name and recognition in high schools and encourage young women to consider Smith as their college choice. Recipients received a copy of the Minnesota Smith Club Oral History Project, Book 2, and a certificate from Smith at their respective school's honor

ceremonies in May.

'A great night to celebrate Smith and the enduring power of women's education' -Kathleen McCartney, President of Smith College

any from our club were fortunate to meet, visit with, and hear the thoughts of our mar-velous new president, Kathleen McCartney, on April 8 at the Radisson Plaza Hotel during one of several events sponsored by the college around the country to introduce her to alumnae.

She characterized the current students as "remarkable, funny, and smart," and said, "They love their president!" She called the faculty "the heart of our enterprise," who are "deeply committed to scholarship and exceptional teaching." She even gave a shout-out to the alumnae, calling us "a force for change," and saying our achievements "exemplify the value of a liberal arts education."

McCartney pointed out that the number of applicants for the seventh year running broke records, at 4,462. Among her many goals for the college are to foster curricular and co-curricular innovation; to support the several academic centers, including the Wurtele Center for Work and Life, made possible through our own Margaret Wurtele '67 and her husband, Angus Wurtele; to explore new learning methods such as online learning for students and alumnae (vev!); and to embrace our mission as a women's college and expand our global footprint (she wants to make Smith THE HOT college for women around the world).

She encouraged us to do our part in the Women for the World campaign for Smith by making Smith a philanthropic priority. More than \$266 million toward the \$450 million goal has already been raised. Calling us part of the movement for women's equality, she asked us each to "be a megaphone" for Smith. **50**
