Thank You from the Board


As the club year draws to a close on June 30th, we thank both Jane Barry, Class of 1968, and Mela Lew, Class of 1983, for their past roles on the Board.

Jane served as our very energetic president for several years and Mela began the process of updating our by-laws which are over 50 years old.


We are grateful for their service to the North Shore Smith College Club!

Treasurer's Notes for Interim Report:

The money donated for Book Awards last year (2019-2020) was used during the summer of 2020 when schools finally announced the winners of the year's awards (graduating juniors). This year (2020-2021) went more smoothly and Iris Sheinhait has been able to send out all of this year's awards on the usual schedule.

Thirty-four of our members included donations to the Club's Scholarship Fund when they registered for the year. Due to a year with reduced expenses, an additional amount from the Club's cash balance is also being sent.

We received a Financial Report from the College for the year ending June 30, 2020 showing that our Scholarship Fund was then \$158,624.23, the net of investment changes and last year's distributions of \$7,455.66.
